ABOUT THE EVENT

The Sir Graeme Douglas International presented by Harcourts Cooper & Co.

Pitting a galaxy of international competitors up against the cream of domestic track and field talent, the tenth edition of the Sir Graeme Douglas International presented by Harcourts Cooper & Co promises to be a classic.

One of just two events in New Zealand boasting World Athletics Continental Tour bronze status – the other being the ITM in Christchurch which took place on 24 February – the three-hour high-paced meeting will showcase the very best in track and field action.

As a Continental Tour event it will offer a pathway into qualification for the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games as both New Zealand and overseas athletes pursue entry standard marks and valuable points.

Among the star performers in action at this year's event include New Zealand javelin record-holder Tori Peeters, who last year claimed a podium spot in the Diamond League final, Commonwealth pole vault bronze medallist Imogen Ayris and 2023 World Championships 100m representative Tiaan Whelpton.

Many of New Zealand's leading Para athletes will also be building up their preparations for Paris led by Paralympic champions Lisa Adams (shot put F37) and Holly Robinson (javelin F46), World Para 200m T36 champion Danielle Aitchison and double World Para silver medallist (400m and Long Jump T36) Will Stedman.



LISA ADAMS

Event: Shot Put F37 DOB: 18 Nov 1990 Based: Rotorua

Fast facts:

- Lisa who was born with a hemiplegia, a form of cerebral palsy, started athletics at the age of 28 and within a year after taking up the sport was crowned 2019 World Para shot put F37 champion.
- At the Tokyo Paralympics she won shot gold to follow in the footsteps of older sister and coach, Dame Valerie Adams, who claimed Olympic shot put gold medals in 2008 and 2012.
- The holder of the world record with a best of 15.50m last year she retained her world title in Paris.



DANIELLE AITCHISON

Event: 100m and 200m T36

DOB: 16 Aug 2001 Based: Hamilton

- Born with cerebral palsy and significant hearing loss, Danielle made her international breakthrough when winning the 200m T36 silver medal at the 2019 World Para Athletics Championships in Dubai.
- Danielle has since gone from strength to strength claiming Paralympic 200m and 100m silver and bronze medals, respectively at the Tokyo Games and last year secured World Para 200m T36 gold in an Oceania record and 100m T36 silver.
- This season Danielle has been in sensational form and in Hamilton in February she ran a national record 13.65 at the Porritt Classic to come within four hundredths of a second of the world record time.





IMOGEN AYRIS

Event: Pole Vault DOB: 12 Dec 2000 Based: Auckland

Fast facts:

- A former gymnast, Imogen took up the pole vault at the age of 13.
- A multiple-winning national age group medallist in pole vault, she gained international experience by competing at the 2018 World U20 Championships and 2019 World University Games.
- A two-time World Championships representative, Imogen enjoyed the highlight of her career so far by winning a bronze medal at the 2022 Commonwealth Games despite competing with a fractured foot.



PORTIA BING


Event: 400m hurdles and sprints

DOB: 17 Apr 1993 Based: Auckland

- A versatile athlete who has won national senior medals in seven different events she initially featured as a multi-eventer, appearing for New Zealand in the heptathlon at the 2015 World Championships.
- She later converted to 400m hurdles where she has gone on to appear at three further World Championships and the 2022 Commonwealth Games, where she finished seventh in the final.
- Her national record-mark for the 400m hurdles set in 2022 stands at 55.44.







ROSIE ELLIOTT

Event: 100m/200m/400m DOB: 7 Nov 1997

Based: Auckland

Fast facts:

- Rosie was a national age group medallist in sprints and high jump before stepping away from the sport in her mid-teens.
- Returning back to athletics shortly before her 21st birthday she has developed into a versatile sprinter winning nationals medals in the 100m, 200m, 400m.
- Last season she secured the New Zealand 200m record, clocking 22.81, secured the national 400m crown and has represented her country over the two-lap distance at each of the past two World Athletics Championships.



SHAY VEITCH

Event: Long Jump DOB: 7 Dec 2000 Based: Dunedin

- A versatile athlete, Shay won a national senior decathlon title in 2020 and the following year claimed a national 400m silver medal.
- More recently focusing on the long jump, he is the reigning national champion and at the 2023 Sir Graeme Douglas International presented by Harcourts Cooper & Co he posted a PB of 7.99m – to climb to joint number two on the all-time NZ lists and within 6cm of the national record mark of Bob Thomas set in 1968.
- He is coached remotely by Wanaka-based Mike Beable. Shay regularly sends training videos to Mike who offers his technical input.







ETHAN OLIVIER

Event: Triple Jump DOB: 7 Aug 2005

Based: Potchefstroom (South Africa)

Fast facts:

- Born in New Zealand but raised for much of his life in South Africa he was introduced to triple jump through his father, a former South African national record-holder.
- Ethan made his international breakthrough for New Zealand when finishing fourth in the triple jump at the 2022 World U20 Championships.
- Last year he surpassed his brother as New Zealand senior triple jump record-holder with a leap of 16.67m in Brussels – one of 29 national triple jump records – including age group and senior – Ethan has set in his career.



WELRE OLIVIER

Event: Triple Jump DOB: 4 Nov 2002

Based: Potchefstroom (South Africa)

- Raised in New Zealand in his formative years like his young sibling, Ethan, the South African-based athlete has committed to competing for New Zealand.
- Last year Welre created history by taking the 45year-old national triple jump record of Phil Wood with a 16.48m effort in Potchefstroom.
- The following month he went on to better this mark with a 16.59m effort in the same city.







TORI PEETERS

Event: Javelin DOB: 17 May 1994 Based: Hamilton

Fast facts:

- Growing up on a Southland dairy farm, Tori began throwing a javelin at school aged 14.
- She set the first of her nine national open records in 2014, extending the mark by more almost nine metres to the 63.26m she achieved in Yokohama last May.
- Tori impressed on the international stage last season finishing second in the Diamond League Final in Eugene.



HOLLY ROBINSON

Event: Shot Put and Javelin F46

DOB: 10 Dec 1994 Based: Dunedin

- An arm amputee, Holly was raised in Hokitika on the West Coast. First trying Para athletics at the age of seven she made her international debut at the 2011 IPC World Championships in Christchurch.
- Enjoying a 13-year-old international career she has won Paralympic gold (2020) and silver (2016) in the javelin F46 and also claimed javelin medals at four World Para Championships and the Gold Coast Commonwealth Games.
- More recently she has also focused her efforts on the shot put F46 and last year claimed a silver medal in this event at the World Para Athletics Championships in Paris.







WILL STEDMAN

Event: 400m T36 and Long Jump T36

DOB: 5 Dec 1999 Based: Christchurch

- Inspired to start athletics by watching the London 2012 Paralympics, four years later he not only made the New Zealand team for the Rio Games but at the age of just 16 he won bronze medals in the men's 400m and 800m T36.
- A consistent harvester of global medals at the Tokyo Paralympic Games he claimed 400m T36 bronze and long jump T36 silver medals.
- Last year at the World Para Athletics Championships he maintained his impressive record at global championships by claiming a brace of silver medals in the 400m and long jump T36.
